#### From the Principal

Dear families.

I would love to start with a good news story hot off the press! Last Thursday it was announced that student Jessica Deane has won a National competition – **Pens against Poverty**, in the category of Year 9/10 Poetry. The judges said her piece was a 'powerful portrait of a young woman in poverty, that doesn't waste a word'. We will feature Jessica's poem and award in the next newsletter.

The Department for Education is working with SA Health to address the concerns about the lower than state average Covid-19 immunisations in Murray Bridge. At the end of last week we were made aware that we will be hosting a vaccination clinic for students and families on this Wednesday Nov 3, with future days made available if demand warrants. Immunisation consent forms have now been sent home with students, along with information for families who can also get vaccinated at MBHS. Extra copies will be available at the SSO. I strongly encourage you to consider vaccination as the best protection you can give your family before the borders reopen. I also understand that it is a decision that families will make together, and I can categorically state that only students with parental consent will be allowed to participate, exactly the same as all other school based immunisations

Our improvement planning work continues and I thank the many who have contributed to the parent survey. We use the information collated and known trends to inform next year's goals. It is just as important to talk about the things that you believe are working and need to remain a priority, as things you would like to see changed. The closing date is Nov 19, and the reminder link was sent to you in an email last week.


#### SAASTA Connect Power Cup by Nick Pearce

This game has everything - things that spin, things that wobble, things to pick up, things to put down, and best of all, a duck! Watch this to learn about the new game.








At the **South Australian FTC Qualifier**, on **Saturday December 4th**, the Bunyips will get to compete in an alliance format against other teams. Each team arrives with a robot, built to meet specific rules, but designed, engineered and programmed differently. The competition itself involves robot inspections, judges' interviews, drivers meeting, practice time, qualification matches, alliance selection, and the elimination finals. If we're lucky enough, we could win an award, be part of the winning alliance or be invited to progress to the Nationals!

Before this, the Bunyips will be meeting other teams in the region for *Science Alive* on *Saturday November 20th* to get prepared for the SA Qualifier. We'll have the opportunity to collaborate and brainstorm with the Roboroos and other South Australian robotics teams to test, refine and practice operating competition robots on a full FTC competition field.

As always, *the Bunyips are welcoming any interested students* and potential new club members to join us at either of these events on a first in basis (spaces limited). *Now is the perfect time to get involved*, as the club explores new avenues on robot development and building.

#### Traineeship description:

Trainees will undertake accredited training over 2 years to complete a Certificate III in Conservation & Eco-systems Management while gaining hands on experience helping to deliver conservation and eco-system management and other projects at Monarto Safari Park.

Conservation and eco-system management work at Monarto Safari Park and nearby areas involves:

- Revegetation and bush restoration work
- Protecting native plant and animal species
- Pest animal and weed management
- Bush food garden management, harvesting and processing
- Cultural heritage management and interpretation of Aboriginal culture
- Working with a range of safari park teams to connect people with nature and save species from extinction

Trainees will need to demonstrate the following personal attributes in their application:

- · Identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander
- An interest in conservation
- · The desire to train and work outdoors
- The ability to work as part of a team
- · The ability to take responsibility for personal work and training goals

## COVID-19 VACCINATION



#### Youth COVID-19 Vaccination Program

#### Information for parents, caregivers and students

Vaccination against COVID-19 is the most effective way to reduce severe illness, hospitalisation and death from infection. As part of the national COVID-19 vaccination rollout, from September 2021, all children 12 years of age and older are eligible to receive vaccination against COVID-19.

#### COVID-19 infection and adolescents

COVID-19 (SARS-CoV-2) can be a serious illness for anyone who gets it, including people who are young, fit and otherwise healthy. As with other respiratory illnesses, some people infected with coronavirus disease may experience mild symptoms and will recover easily, and in others it can cause very serious disease, long term health issues, and death.

New variants or strains of the COVID-19 virus can spread more easily across all age groups and can increase the risk of developing COVID 19. Australia, like many other countries across the world, has seen higher numbers of adolescents and children becoming infected, particularly from the Delta variant. Adolescents and adults now have similar rates of infection

#### COVID-19 vaccination and children/adolescents

The Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) has approved the use of the Comirnaty<sup>™</sup> (Pfizer) and Spikevax<sup>™</sup> (Moderna) mRNA COVID-19 vaccines from the age of 12 years of age and above. The Australian Technical Advisory Group on Immunisation (ATAGI) has reviewed available information on the safety and efficacy of both these vaccines in children aged 12 years and above, as well as the risk of getting infected COVID-19 in this age group, and evidence of wider benefits and risks of vaccinating children; and it is recommending offering COVID-19 vaccine to all children in this age group.

There is growing evidence that vaccinated people are less infectious if they do catch COVID-19, which means getting vaccinated is the best way you can protect yourself, your loved ones and the community.

#### The Comirnaty™ (Pfizer) COVID-19 vaccine

Comirnaty (Pfizer Australia Pty Ltd) is a vaccine that can prevent people from becoming ill from COVID-19. Comirnaty does not contain any live virus, and it cannot give you COVID-19. It contains the genetic code for an important part of the COVID-19 virus called the spike protein. After getting the vaccine, your body makes copies of the spike protein. Your immune system will then learn to recognise and fight the COVID-19 virus. The genetic code is then broken down quickly by the body.

#### Benefits of the vaccine

People who have had two doses of Comirnaty are about 95 per cent less likely to get symptoms of COVID-19 than people who did not get the vaccine. Protection against COVID-19 starts from about 2–3 weeks after the first dose. While one dose may give some protection, it may not be long lasting. Two doses will give optimal protection. No vaccine is 100% effective, so it is possible that you can still get sick from COVID-19 after vaccination.

Even if you have been vaccinated with two doses of Comirnaty, you should still get a COVID-19 test if you have symptoms (e.g. fever, cough, sore throat).
